Identity and security


- Identity is traditionally based on a stable 'self'
- Security and identity have been regarded as inseparable
- Identity structures the moral, political, social subject
- Identity 2.0 is a logic of verification and certification
- Security in identity 2.0 involves meta-knowledge
- Security in identity 2.0 reconfigures trust

Social ethics of the biometric person

- Biometrics drives the shift toward identity 2.0
- The personhood is field of verification and certification
- Biometric identity disrupts moral identity

Security 2.0

- Insecurity will shift toward identity threats
- Prophylactic models are entirely exhausted
- Security provisions are detachable from the person



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
